# Live the Word

### Mon 15 Jun Liturgy of the Day

1 Kings 21:1-16; Psalm 5; Matthew 5:38-42

As we are able to receive with grateful acknowledgement of the Giver, so we should be able to heed Jesus' command to 'give to the one who asks of you...'. Like God, we must become generous of heart.

### Tue 16 Jun Liturgy of the Day

1 Kings 21:17-29; Psalm 51; Matthew 5:43-48

Jesus does not intend us to remain in a situation where we are 'persecuted'... but to remember that divine love is stronger than the desire to hate. We are to love and pray for those who seek to wound us.

### Wed 17 Jun Liturgy of the Day

2 Kings 2:1-6-14; Psalm 31; Matthew 6:1-6.16-18

We often go about our lives thinking we are in control of everything. But in truth we begin with God and we end with God. And our whole life in between is, in a sense, a journey to let go and discover this reality.

### Thu 18 Jun Liturgy of the Day

St Romuald (951-1027) was a hermit and the founder of the Camaldolese Order. He encouraged constant effort in seeking the "prayer of the heart", and waiting for God's grace with total inner emptiness.

## Paul among the Philosophers

Paul, Silas and Timothy began the second missionary journey in 50 A.D. They started in Greece (Berea), but Paul had to move on almost at once and headed for the centre of Greek culture, Athens. Paul's ability to live and work in different cultures is marked by his ministry in Jerusalem (Hebrew), Athens (Greek) and Rome (Latin).

Fortunately, Luke has given us a vivid account of Paul among the philosophers in Acts 17:16-34. It was Paul's custom to begin his ministry in a place by first going to the synagogue and then to the town centre to preach in the central square. So it was that he preached at the main marketplace in Athens, the Areopagus.

Paul's sermon has been called "a masterclass in the evangelization of a culture". Paul was confronted by two world views: Stoicism and Epicurianism.

A stoa was a roofed colonnade in ancient Greece where people would walk up and down with a philosopher named Zeno discussing current issues, mostly of a philosophical kind. Hence, those who followed Zeno's teaching were called Stoics. They believed in a fully materialist world though they had a high moral standard and demanded strict control of feelings and passions.

Followers of Epicurius also embraced a materialist view of the world, but their goal was pleasure, especially in refinement of taste in food and drink. Today we would call an epicure a hedonist or a sensualist.

Both Stoics and Epicurians mocked Paul's initial speeches about Jesus but invited him to

present his case in the Areopagus.

Paul set the scene for his proclamation by acknowledging the religious spirit of his listeners, illustrated by the many shrines to local or national deities; but he hit on the shrine that had been erected to the "Unknown God".

Cleverly, he then unpacked his message about the God of the Hebrews and the Christians. Paul revealed God to be Creator, Sustainer and Judge. When he spoke of the Incarnation of Christ, and the Resurrection of Jesus, the scoffing began again. Some of his audience called him a "Babbling"!

Despite the cool reception of his

word some did respond positively and became the first Athenian converts. Among the converts were Dionysius the Areopagite and Damaris, a woman. Paul saw his work in Athens as sowing the seed of the gospel.

The point for us is that Paul was not afraid to engage with the great issues of his day; he welcomed questions and he set a standard of knowledge and interest which should mark any evangelistic ministry. His sermon in the Areopagus quoted Greek poets and thinkers. He was able to agree with the Stoics that the world is good and beautiful, and with the Epicurians that God cannot be limited to this world. He was able to take what good he found in paganism and lead it to the revelation that is Christianity.

The great Pauline scholar, N.T. Wright, wrote: "Paul upstages the claims and systems of paganism in the name, and for the glory, of the one God of Israel, the God now revealed through Jesus and the Spirit".

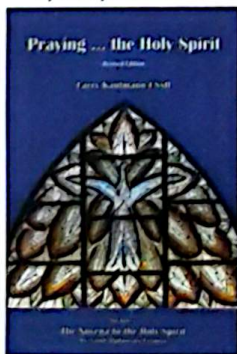
